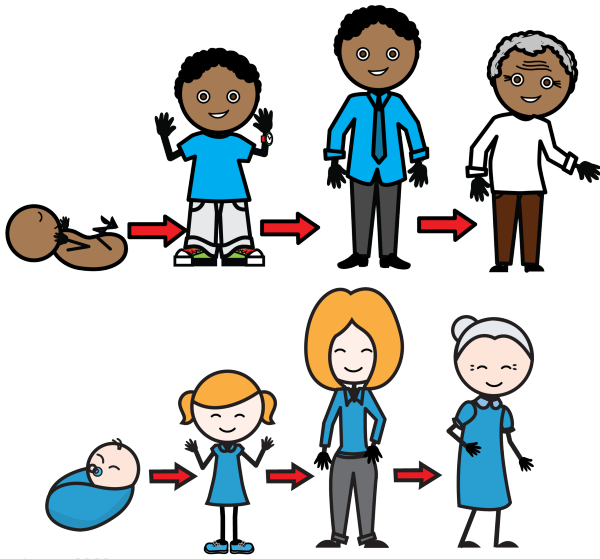

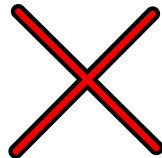
Autistic children grow into autistic adults.

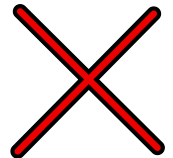

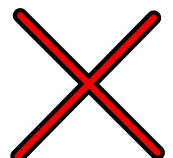

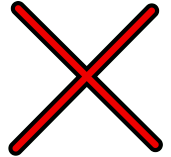
